Just a Reminder: Keep in mind all the unique situations that can arise during District play – the winning point spreads, the possible need to run extra points at the end of a game, and the usual rules that apply to OT periods. Remember, if a game goes to OT, the maximum point spread is -1 or +1.

Also, as a reminder, District play is NOT the time to forget to contact school administrators prior to a contracted game. "The Earlier in the week, the better: It seems that contacting administrators earlier in the week, when their minds aren't centered on the Homecoming gate receipts, etc., is a good idea. If you haven't called already, do so the day you receive this.

Some Oldies, But Goodies: I gleaned this information from a Weekly Big 12 newsletter: Forward Progress: One of the best quotes I ever heard was in relationship to the philosophy of Forward Progress: No official was ever criticized for giving ½ yard too much – but Hell Hath No Fury like a coach that believes his runner has been robbed of ½ yard of forward progress. Another issue that needs our attention is that some teams either refuse to line up correctly or have not been appropriately taught. Letting an offensive team have a "bow effect" on the LOS provides a great advantage for the offense. CALL IT!!

We need to Continue to Protect Defenseless Players, especially quarterbacks. I watch way too many late hits that go unpunished. Remember, R is responsible for the safety of the QB – stay with him every step of the play,

Also rough play on the QB can include unnecessary throwing of the passer to the ground after the ball is thrown and using the top of the helmet to butt, ram, or spear the opponent. Watch the **entirety** of the play.

Tough Calls by Position – U: Did the snapper move the ball (or pick it up) prior to the snap? Was the pass a catch or a trap (very important for U to have a good look here)? Was the snapper hit before his 1 second protection period? Did Defensive signals cause A to false start? Was the receiver on of the pass on the fake punt eligible? Do you know the numbers of the ineligible receivers on scrimmage kicks? Do you use a LBPI (Lateral Ball Position Indicator)? Are you always concentrating on your keys at the snap (two guards and the center)? There are so many issues facing the umpire that it can sometimes be a little overwhelming – down, distance, keys, snaps, holding, false starts, ineligible, and the basic desire to be able to survive until the next play. By the way, did you confirm the number of offensive players with the R? Did you remember to remind the R after a play near the sidelines to either wind the clock or start it on the snap? Survival!! An excellent umpire can be a key to a successful crew – the crew surely cannot be very good without one!
